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Pastoral Ponderings

In the traditional church calendar, the seasons of Advent and Lent were primarily penitential. Advent was intended to prepare us for Christ's birth and his ultimate return; Lent, to prepare for his death and the celebration of resurrection. These were serious seasons focused on an awareness of human sin and brokenness accompanied by the disciplines of confession and penance and fasting. With the secularization of Christmas in the last century, Advent has become lighter and more joyful, with an emphasis more on the hope found in Christ than despair over the human condition. However, world events and the election cycle in the fall of 2016 led to an

Advent that was more solemn than many in recent memory.

In mainline Protestantism, Lent is no longer the heavily penitential time of the ancient church, but it is still a serious season focused on following Jesus faithfully, all the way to the cross if necessary. Lent begins on March 1, but many of us have not had much sense of relief or a lightening of the spiritual mood between Advent and Lent, as would usually happen. We are more aware than ever of the polarizations within our country, within our families. We are more aware than ever of the deep divisions between different factions of Christianity, those which have been theological becoming increasingly political as well.

As the cultural and political landscape suddenly shifts, the season of Lent arrives to help us grapple with perennial questions about the true cost of discipleship. What might be required of us at this point in history? Where will we find wisdom and courage for the living of these days?

Wisdom may be found among all the saints that have gone ahead of us, all the stories of faithful discipleship exercised courageously in difficult, fearful circumstances. Writer Joyce Hollyday describes visiting a Salvadoran refugee camp in Honduras, where injustice and suffering were daily realities. A short-term missionary from Indiana named Yvonne was there. One refugee woman asked Yvonne why she always looked so sad and burdened. Yvonne answered by talking about the grief she felt over all the suffering she was witnessing and her commitment to give all of herself to the struggle of the refugees.

The Salvadoran woman gently confronted her and said, "Only people who expect to go back to North America in a year work the way you do. You cannot be serious about our struggle unless you play and celebrate and do those things that make it possible to give a lifetime to it."

And they meant it, too. Every time the refugees were displaced and had to build a new camp, they immediately formed three committees: a construction committee, an education committee, and the *comite'* de alegria—'the committee of joy.' Celebration was as basic to the life of the refugees as digging latrines and teaching their children to read. (*Clothed with the Sun: Biblical Women, Social Justice and Us*,)

Our Lenten theme is Creating Communities of Resistance, Resilience and Joy. We resist human understandings of success and power, in order to participate in the God's design for shalom for the world. We do this in ways that bring strength and courage, enabling us to be faithful followers of Jesus for the long term. And in a bold counter-cultural move, going against even well-established church culture, we will choose joy now, in Lent, even before we celebrate the resurrection on Easter. This newsletter is full of information about ways you can participate in our life together this Lent.

Because we each find joy and strength in different ways, the opportunities are many and varied. We need each other in the struggle and the celebration. Please join us.





Fellowship Fund Collection:

What is the Fellowship Fund at Emmanuel Baptist Church?

• Money available to provide financial assistance to those in need.

How is the Fellowship Fund maintained?

- Money is specifically designated for this fund.
- Money is collected through the "Fellowship Fund collection" How is the Fellowship Fund administered?
- The Pastor receives a special needs request.
- The Chairperson of the Caring & Fellowship Commission is consulted for requests.
- The Treasurer for Benevolence administers the funds to fulfill the request.
- All requests are treated with discretion and confidentiality.

How does someone contribute to the Fellowship Fund collection?

• There will be envelopes provided each Communion Sunday (1st Sunday of the month) marked as "Fellowship Fund" with a place to put your name. All gifts in these envelopes will be deposited into the fellowship fund checking account.

What has the Fellowship Fund been used for in the recent past?

- Current Balance: approximately \$10,000 as of January 1, 2017
- In 2016, \$3,169 was withdrawn to meet financial needs.
- In 2014, \$5,000 was loaned to the Community Loan Fund
- Based in Albany
- Facilitates much needed community development projects throughout the Capital Region
- In January, 2017, the term for the loan to the Community Loan Fund was extended to mature in January, 2020.
