# REV. B. T. WELCH D. D. 1794. 1870. A BAPTIST PREACHER OF RAME ELOQUENCE, AND A PUBLIC-SPIRITED CITIZEN, TO WHOSE ZEAL THIS CEMETRY OWES ITS EXISTENCE.

## Pastoral Ponderings

Some of you may have made a trip to the cemetery before or during Memorial Day weekend. I have never visited any of my loved ones' final resting places, except as part of a funeral. We never lived close to where family members were buried, so I did not grow up with the tradition of visiting graves on Memorial Day or any other day.

However, this year, I did make a trip to the cemetery just a little in advance of Memorial Day. I went to Albany Rural Cemetery to find the grave of the Rev. Dr. Bartholomew Welch. Dr. Welch was the founding pastor of Pearl Street Baptist Church which became known as Emmanuel Baptist in 1871, when it moved up to its current location. He served first as the pastor of the First Baptist Church in Albany for seven years, and then left that church, along with 123 of its members, to plant Pearl Street in 1834. I shared some of that history in my sermon on May 14. Reading the speeches from our fiftieth and seventy-fifth anniversary celebrations, I learned that Dr. Welch was buried in the cemetery he had advocated to build. Curious, I went to find his grave.


The Rev. Henry King was Emmanuel's seventh pastor, from 1882-1891. (As an aside, Rev. King officiated at 248 funerals during those 9 years!) Speaking at the church's 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary, Rev. King said, "It is not too much to say that

Dr. Welch was a preacher without a peer in his own denomination and probably without a superior in any denomination. His pulpit was probably the most attractive pulpit in the city . . ." [ All quotations are from *Emmanuel Baptist Church Albany Centennial* 1834-1934]

On the other hand, in 1839, a few church members were displeased with his preaching. These reasons were recorded for their dissatisfaction:

- "That the line of distinction between the church and the world was not sufficiently preserved."
- "That the children's bread was cast to the dogs."
- "That the pastor inculcated too much confidence, in the work of salvation, in human agency." Good luck to the Pastoral Relations Committee tasked with interpreting those concerns!

Dr. Welch was involved in establishing the Rochester Theological Seminary, which we know now as Colgate Rochester Crozer Divinity School. One of the early presidents of that school described him with these words, "Bartholomew T. Welch was a man made for the pulpit, of emotional temperament and extraordinary flow of language. Reason and imagination were unusually combined in his utterance. In Brooklyn and in Albany he drew great crowds to hear him. . . At the capital of the State, members of the Legislature and professional men came a half hour before his service in order to secure seats in the house of worship."



He was remembered for his eloquent passion at a denominational gathering before Baptists had divided into Northern and Southern tribes. The issue of human slavery was being debated intensely, with Dr. Welch arguing strenuously against it. He was interrupted with the question, "If you lived in the South in the midst of slavery and were the owner of slaves by inheritance, what would you do?" "Do, do?" he exclaimed, "I would proclaim liberty to the captives and the opening of the prison doors to them that are bound, and would preach the acceptable year of the Lord." The response to his statement was overwhelming, with the result that the convention was adjourned.

Dr. Welch served First Baptist for 7 years and Pearl Street for 14 years. Then he moved to Brooklyn and served the Pierpont Street Church for 8 years. At the end of that time, he returned to Albany to serve The Baptist Church in Newton

Corners which was founded in 1849, but went out of existence sometime before 1884. He retired in failing health and died as a member of Pearl Street Church in 1870.

He was buried in an unmarked grave, but funds for marker were gathered as part of the church's 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary celebration. I went to the cemetery, not knowing whether I would find Dr. Welch's grave and in what condition it would be. I was happy to locate it near the edge of an old section, in a spot where I could hear running water down below the hill. I stood there for a few moments, simply appreciating the history of Emmanuel and Albany which has shaped our present and our future.

Then, as I took the first steps back to my car, the name on the next gravestone, Friend Humphrey, caught my eye. Friend Humphrey was a member of First Baptist when it incorporated in 1811. He became a founding deacon and trustee at Pearl Street. He served as NY Senator in 1839 and Mayor of Albany in 1843, 1844, and 1849. His name is interspersed through much of Pearl Street's early history. I was touched to see the two

graves so near each other, as if the pastor and the lay leader's friendship endured to death and beyond.

Spiritual growth can be hard to measure. You can't use a tape measure or a scale or blood pressure cuff to determine where you are on a spiritual maturity scale. And yet, there are some indicators.

One of those indicators is our relationship to money, our ability to spend wisely, to save well and to give generously. In the past several years, as a congregation, we have grown in this area. We have taken some time to understand that giving has fallen off in churches over many decades and that some of that decline is because of a lack of stewardship education. So, we have begun to educate ourselves. We have reminded ourselves that Jesus says more about money than any other topic, except the Kingdom of God, so it must be important. We have challenged ourselves to develop habits of generosity and to take on the discipline of giving a percentage of our income to God. We have separated the building of a budget from the making of pledges, because we understand that we give to God as an act of discipleship and faith, not simply to pay the church's bills.

Each fall an intentional focus on this aspect of spiritual growth is led by the Stewardship Committee. Their work begins in the summer. We need about 6 people willing to lead this effort in the fall of 2017. These leaders need to be willing to learn about stewardship and willing to engage others in the learning process. They don't need to be tithing already. They don't even need to know what the word "tithing" means. Please prayerfully consider whether God is calling you to this task at this time. If you will respond affirmatively to that call, please speak with Pastor Kathy by June 11<sup>th</sup>.
