Pastoral Ponderings

Summer is such a gift. I've always enjoyed the summer, but living in this time zone where darkness comes so early in the winter has made me truly appreciate the increased sunshine of the summer months. And while a few recent days have been humid, upstate New York certainly offers much more comfortable temperatures and humidity than July and August in the Midwest.

I am looking forward to good things this summer,

including two Baptist gatherings. Along with Judy Henningson, Kathy Moore, Tony and Marilyn Malone, and Jim Wilkerson, I will be attending the American Baptist Mission Summit/Biennial in Portland, Oregon. This is the every-other-year convening of our denomination for a little bit of business, and a lot of conversation, workshops, and celebrating what other Baptists are up to in our nation and around the world. Prior to the official Biennial, Jim will participate in a one-day seminar on trauma and resilience provided by the Baptist Peace Fellowship of North America while I attend the Theologians Conference.

Worship on Sunday at the Biennial will include preaching by the Rev. Dr. Lee Spitzer, who began his service as our new General Secretary on June 1. Until then, he was the Executive Minister for the American Baptist Churches in New Jersey. He has served congregations in New Jersey, Nebraska and Rhode Island. Look elsewhere in this newsletter for his first pastoral letter.

Later in July, Jim and I will attend the annual gathering of the Baptist Peace Fellowship- ~ Bautistas por la Paz, aka Peace Camp. For the first time ever, it is being held in Mexico. Peace and justice-seeking Baptists in four nations (Canada, Mexico, Puerto Rico and the USA) participate together in the work of the peace fellowship. The location of this year's summer conference was planned years in advance, but, providentially, it occurs at a time of political tension between the governments of Mexico and the USA. Merely attending peace camp this year seems like an act of resistance. Daily events will be conducted primarily in Spanish, with

translation into English and some indigenous Mexican languages. I trust that we will learn much from being on the receiving end of translation and the gracious hospitality of our Mexican hosts. International travel is always a stretching experience for me. Please pray for us and for all who will be there. (And if you're sad to miss it, remember that next year's peace camp will be in Keuka, New York!)

EBC will provide a neutral pulpit on July 9th, as the search committee from a sister congregation worships with us in order to hear the preaching of a possible new pastor. We will host the combined FOCUS service on August 6th with communion and a sermon on the feeding of the 5,000 -- which seems appropriate for a ministry that feeds hungry people on a daily basis. When I'm not at Baptist gatherings or on one week of vacation in August, my summer preaching will be from Matthew's gospel, highlighting Jesus' teachings on what it means to be a disciple.

Summer always goes so quickly. I hope you are looking forward to events in your own life this summer. Enjoy the rhythm of the season, but don't forget your community of faith. Participate in summer picnics and worship opportunities. Send letters to kids at camp. Stock up on school supplies for FOCUS. And give thanks to God for the all the good gifts of this season.

Our newest tenant is a house church. The congregation is composed of 6-8 families of Kachin people. They do not have a pastor and are not formally organized as a church, but they have been meeting together weekly in homes for more than a year. Needing just a bit more breathing-room than was available in any one house or apartment, and knowing of EBC's hospitality to the Gethsemane Karen church, they approached us. Beginning on July 2, they will use the fellowship hall and parlor on Sunday evenings from 5:00-8:00 p.m. The first three months are a gift. After that, they will contribute \$100 per month for building use.

The Kachin people have a story with some similarities and some differences from the Karen people. Both are refugee peoples from Myanmar/Burma. The Kachins come from the north, while the Karens originated in the Kayin State on the border with Thailand. There are many more Karen people than Kachin people in the USA. Of the four Kachin church leaders who met with Kathy Donley and Tom Lahut, one has only been here for just 2 years, while

another has lived in the USA for 9 years with the other two falling somewhere in between. The man with 9 years of residency happens to be Karen. He is married to a Kachin woman, and while he socializes with members of the Gethsemane Karen church, he worships in Kachin with his wife. This congregation includes 6 children, ranging in age from 3 to 10 years old. Some of the parents expressed interest in bringing their children to EBC's Sunday School when it resumes in the fall.

There are not yet many Kachin Baptist churches in the United States, with perhaps as few as 19 self-contained congregations nationwide. It is significant that EBC has the opportunity to be connected to one of them at this time. As of June 2016, the Kachin Baptist Churches USA is an Associated Ministry Organization with the ABC/USA. Some members of Kachin churches and denominational leadership will be present at the Portland Mission Summit for the first time with that status. People from all over the world keep coming to us, continuing to present Emmanuel with exciting opportunities to welcome God's many-hued children into the tapestry of faith.

Two Upcoming Mission Trips:

Rwanda: Horror into Hope

Last year many of us viewed the film "Hotel Rwanda" which was a documentary about the genocide in Rwanda. It was disturbing to watch and left us questioning why, and what could be done to help even now. Two pastors from NY, Jim & Suzi Harriff, have made several mission trips to Rwanda to encourage the people, to help them rebuild, and to walk along side them on their journey. ABC/NYS has chosen to focus on their ministry for the next 3 years, sponsoring mission trips and encouraging other New Yorkers to join them. The first of these trips will be January 15-28, 2018. There are no special skills necessary, as their leadership will match your skills and interests to areas where help is needed. Travel arrangements will need to be made in the fall and the group size is limited to 10. From a Pastoral Letter by ABCUSA General Secretary, Rev. Dr. Lee B. Spitzer June 16, 2017



Dear ABCUSA Family:

The recent terrorist attacks in England, the apparently politically motivated shooting that took place in Virginia, ongoing debates over how to treat immigrants and visitors to our country, and the struggles of another Baptist denomination to take a clear stand on issues related to white supremacy remind us all that we are living in a violent and divided world that desperately needs to overcome every form of social and political discrimination and search for more just ways to live in harmony. In 2017, American Baptists gladly and forthrightly reassert our fundamental Baptist convictions regarding individual liberty, dignity and respect for all people, regardless of their racial or ethnic heritage, political or religious beliefs, or any other factor. In 1976, the General Board affirmed a policy statement on human rights, which said:

"Baptist history is rooted in concern for conscience and for freedom of individual beliefs, for choice, and for unregimented living whether by religious dogma and institution or by social and political structures. John Bunyan in prison and Roger Williams driven from Massachusetts, reflect commitment to these ideas, as did Martin Luther King, in his witness to human dignity and the rights of minority groups. Resolutions by the American Baptist Churches over the years have particularly sought to reflect the denomination's basic principles of freedom of thought and belief, the right of dissent, the responsibility to speak prophetically to church and society and support for human dignity and social justice."

... In the past, American Baptists have expressed these convictions in resolutions and statements, which make clear we have consistently opposed every form of racism and discrimination... We also have clearly stated in the past that American Baptists reject violence as a means of achieving one's social, religious or political goals...

...how should we as American Baptists respond to the challenges we face in today's troubled and fractured society? I suggest we not only re-affirm the statements of the past, but resolve to live them out in practical and consistent ways in our individual and congregational spiritual journeys. ..

To bring our thoughts and actions in line with our expressed convictions, we must re-engage Scripture and let its message take control of our beliefs, attitudes, emotions and actions. Please consider these as a starting point in such a transformational journey: James 1:19-20, 26-27; 1 Corinthians 13:3-7

As I reflect on these Scriptures, I glean the following challenges to help us all hold fast to our Baptist convictions while also contributing to a more harmonious American civic life:

- 1. Commit to listen more graciously and with an open mind, especially when we are in conversation with people who hold different views than we do.
- 2. Reject anger, rudeness, hatred, arrogance, and egotism in our dealings with others. Being prophetic is not compatible with being obsessive, abusive or insensitive.
- 3. Do not forget that people we disagree with are still human beings, and desire respect, grace and acceptance. The Golden Rule still applies to human relationships.
- 4. Be patient before responding to situations and people; oftentimes, first reports of an event do not convey the whole truth. Knee-jerk reactions are seldom helpful.
- 5. Do not assume that one's own position on an issue is the only Christian response to which all others must subscribe. We know only "in part," as Paul says.

As American Baptists, may we, through our words and actions, "let our light shine before others, so that they may see our good deeds" (Matthew 5:16) and be drawn to Jesus Christ, our Lord!"




