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Pastoral Ponderings

Sometimes you hear words in a new way. They're the same words I've heard all my life. I've probably even said them. But they came to me as a startling insight, provoking internal questions I haven't answered yet.

I was listening to Dr. Aidsand Wright-Riggins. For almost 25 years, he was the Executive Director of what is now called The American Baptist Home Mission Society. He is well known for his strong leadership on social justice issues. He was speaking at the Ella Baker Justice Dinner on Tuesday night of the New Baptist Covenant Summit in

Ella Baker was an African-American civil rights and human rights activist. Born in Virginia in 1903, she lived in New York City for most of her adult life. She exercised leadership in the NAACP and the Southern Leadership Conference and the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee. She has been called "one of the most important African American leaders of the twentieth century and perhaps the most influential woman in the Civil Rights Movement." Early at this dinner, we heard stories of the ways she organized grassroots people for racial and economic equality. Ella Baker was known by the nickname of Fundi, which is a Swahili word that means a person who teaches a craft or skill to the next generation. When Dr. Wright-Riggins spoke, it was to tell us that on the following evening, the first Ella Baker Justice Award was going to be presented to Congressman John Lewis, honoring his lifetime of work.

Dr. Wright-Riggins described a circle of justice which spiraled from one generation to the next. Ella Baker represented the generation before Martin Luther King Jr. The generation before her included such folks as W. E. B. DuBois and Booker T. Washington. Dr. Wright-Riggins continued to name luminaries who overlapped with Ella Baker and succeeded her, including Rosa Parks and James Baldwin.

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Repeating the image of the circle of justice-makers, he brought it to the present, naming John Lewis and then "the people in this room". His clear implication was that the people in the room just then had a responsibility to seek and maintain justice for the next generation.

Those were the words that came as a shock to my system. I looked around the room. Perhaps 150 people were present. It was a group large enough that any one person could remain somewhat anonymous, or so my introverted self wanted to believe. On the other hand, if these were the individuals on whom the next generation of Baptist justice-seekers across the United States were to depend, it did not seem nearly large enough. What did it mean that I was present in the room? It would be ridiculous to believe that I could have any effect on the unbroken circle of justice. . . . Ridiculous, right?

I quit listening for a minute and reflected internally, "I am a local church pastor. I'm not famous or particularly special. I don't have any kind of national or even a regional following. I don't even have that many Facebook friends. Of all the people in this room right now, I must be the least significant. How could the continuation of this circle possibly depend on me?"

"We are always only one generation away from the extinction of the Christian faith." Those are words I have heard before, words I have said before. But . . . sometimes you hear words in a new way.

Now to him who by the power at work within us is able to accomplish abundantly far more than all we can ask or imagine, to him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus to all generations, forever and ever. Amen. Ephesians 3:20-21

World Mission Offering



The theme of this year's American Baptist Churches, International Ministries World Mission Offering is "Come, follow me." We have designated Emmanuel's offering to support the work of Dan Buttry.

Dan is the Global Consultant for Peace and Justice with International Ministries of the American Baptist Churches. He works around the world, usually on short term peace projects. His area of specialty is conflict transformation. Simply put, conflict transformation means turning conflict from negative, destructive experiences into positive, constructive experiences in which problems are solved, unjust relationships are structured in more just ways, violence is replaced by nonviolent means of dealing with disagreements, torn relationships are reconciled, decisions become more participatory and traumatized people are supported for healing.

Emmanuel recently received a letter from Dan, thanking us for our past support and listing the projects he and Sharon Buttry were involved in last year. Here are a couple of examples:

- o Trained Syrian and Lebanese church folks involved in ministries to refugees and displaced people from the civil war in Syria on trauma and self-care.
- Advised, coordinated with, and developed financial support for a network of young African peacemakers who led trainings and did mediation in Uganda, Kenya, Central African Republic, Zimbabwe, Rwanda, Burundi, D.R. Congo, Tanzania and Senegal.


