Pastoral Ponderings

Christianity has sometimes been described as a very wide river containing diverse currents and streams. It is also a river that has been flowing for centuries. We are separated into our own stream and our time, knowing little of what happened upriver or at the level of the undercurrent.

Thanks to the ecumenical movement, we might be aware of other American Protestant traditions and have cordial relationships with Roman Catholic Christians, but most of us still are unfamiliar with Eastern Christianity or the Orthodox Church. The Russian Orthodox recognize the vocation of Holy Fools. These are people whose lives are at odds with the rules of normal society to the extent that even other Christians find them troubling. Holy Fools undeniably manifest the Christ-like qualities of humility, obedience and compassion, often in ways that call attention to injustice or abuse.

Basil the Blessed was born near Moscow around 1469. He went naked in summer and winter as a statement that all human beings are equal at the skin level. The stories about

Basil marvel at his relationship with Tsar Ivan IV (Ivan the Terrible) who was greatly feared by most people. Legend says that Basil gave Ivan a piece of raw meat during Lent, when all Orthodox Christians were fasting. The Tsar, claiming to be devout, refused the meat. Basil responded by asking why he followed the rules of Lent while he spilled the blood of Christians. Remarkably, Ivan did not have Basil arrested or beheaded, but sent him gifts and assured him of his protection. St. Basil's Cathedral on Red Square in Moscow is named in his memory.

Pondering our Lenten theme of Foolish Love, I found myself wanting to know more about this Christian tradition. I discovered the book *Jesus the Holy Fool* by Elizabeth Anne-Stewart. I have not yet read it, but I have discovered that it contains the provocative thoughts like these:

"Following Jesus is a radically different proposition for example, than following 'my buddy Jesus' and practicing a Christianity which can only be described as self-indulgent. Precisely because contemporary Western Christianity has become disconnected from the Holy Foolishness of Christ and from the Dionysian elements of religion, the person of Jesus has been 'tamed' into a marketable construct far removed from the gospel Jesus or from the living Christ who can still be encountered in Third World nations. ... [The Western church] cower[s] in dread before the figure of the Dionysian Christ because he is too passionate, too alive, and too challenging to be attractive."

"Those who tame Christmas into a birthday party for children or who reduce Easter to a celebration of the rites of Spring are following a Jesus who bears little resemblance to the Jesus of the Gospels. In their Christianity, there is no place for Jesus the Clown, or Jesus the Jester or Jesus the Trickster; such a Jesus is too demanding, too disturbing, too ridiculous. And yet this Jesus, vested as 'a personification of festivity and fantasy,' in an age which has lost both, and wearing both grease paint and halo, 'is able to touch our jaded modern consciousness as other images of Christ cannot."

And so the season begins, offering strong love and a Jesus who will not be domesticated and the foolishness of the cross. The Body of Christ is strongest when we are together. If you are considering taking on a spiritual practice for Lent, perhaps the best discipline we might engage together is the habit of showing up and being fully present as often as possible.

Within these six weeks, our communal life will seriously and playfully explore the notion of God's love for the world which is paradoxically wise and foolish. Sunday morning worship will engage Biblical texts about God's covenant love established with human beings and with creation, as well as reflections on some of those who were willing to be "fools for Christ's sake" as the apostle Paul described in his letter to the church at Corinth. Listen for our choir's rendition of the Prayer of St..Francis. Francis of Assisi is one of the best known Holy Fools. Beyond Sunday morning, there will be other opportunities for some serious foolishness, including movie nights and a St. Patrick's Day Party and Sunday School. Special Election of Trustees February 11




