The last Sunday of the liturgical year was also the Sunday before Thanksgiving and worship was focused on gratitude. In my sermon I said that we are so surrounded with abundant goodness and beauty, that we often fail to notice it. I suggested that what we are accustomed to, we don't notice and what we don't notice, we won't be grateful for. If we want gratitude to play a bigger part in our lives, perhaps we can start by making a habit of noticing. We are entering what is for many, the busiest month of the year. It coincides with Advent, the beginning of the church year and a



meaningful season in its own right. But it often happens that we rush through it preoccupied and overscheduled. In our busyness, we fail to notice the goodness, the surprises, the moments of wonder, which could bring joy, and we miss it.

On that Sunday, we spent some time together in reflection. Some listed current blessings, what we are grateful for right now. Others anticipated the upcoming season and noted those things we especially want to be present for, the things we don't want to pass by unnoticed. Taken together, these represent our intentions to notice with joy and gratitude what is beautiful and true and lovely and good. 
We want to be present and notice

Advent includes three opportunities for adult Sunday School this year. We will devote those to a deeper dive into the Biblical texts that surround the birth of Jesus. Amy-Jill Levine, professor of New Testament at Vanderbilt Divinity School will be our guide, appearing via video-tape each week. Dr. Levine describes herself as "a Yankee Jewish feminist who teaches in a predominantly Protestant divinity school in the buckle of the Bible Belt." In *Light of the World*, she shows how the Gospel narratives connect to the Old Testament; highlights the role of women in first-century Jewish culture; and emphasizes the importance of Mary's visitation, the census, the stable, the star of Bethlehem, and the flight to Egypt. Join us in the parlor after coffee hour on December 1

for "The Promise of Potential", on December 8 for "The Journey to Joy" and on December 15 for "The Gifts of the Gentiles".

We celebrate communion on the first Sunday of every month. The table is not ours, but Christ's, and all are welcome there. We are called to serve God by serving each other and the wider world. Those who distribute the bread and the cup in worship embody the varieties of acts of service in which we each engage in other realms



of life. We invite you to take a turn at the table as an act of worship and a sign of mutual service. ADVENT – CHRISTMAS WORSHIP



"Joy to the World," a beloved Christmas classic, turns 300 this year. Composer Isaac Watt's interpretation of Psalm 98 invites us to sing a "new song"—and it is a powerful cosmic performance of all creation being renewed and freed. Rather than "joy" being yet another word for "happiness," we will discover that the depths of joy can be found especially in the midst of suffering, the work of justice, and the presence of compassion all part of the coming of Jesus to this world and a message the world still so desperately needs.

Where is EBC Going? - An Invitation

At the congregational meeting of October 20th, the congregation approved a suggestion by the Executive Team to form a committee tasked with imagining what EBC might look like in the future and what missions we might begin. This Visioning Committee will meet twice monthly for 6 months. They will be reading two to three books in that time, including, but not limited to, Scripture. There may be other

research required. They will report to the Executive Team, who will pass the findings on to the Congregation. They will have no governing authority.

The Visioning Committee is open to anyone, but joining the committee requires a strong, firm commitment to its work and to the intense schedule required. An organizational/informational meeting will be held in January and the committee itself will begin work the first week in February. 
