## Pastoral Ponderings



In the church year, this is the season of Pentecost and after Pentecost. We sometimes call it "Ordinary Time" which was originally "Ordinal Time," as in ordinal numbers. Pentecost falls on May 31 this year. The next Sunday, June 7 is the First Sunday after Pentecost, June 14 is the Second after Pentecost and so on. So, Pentecost is one Sunday with a whole season that follows. Pentecost celebrates the outpouring of the Holy Spirit, which comes as a flood of energy. Acts 2 offers the competing images of a mighty wind and fire and multiple language and a stirring speech by Peter. It feels like the

Holy Spirit provides more energy and creativity than can be absorbed by those present.

Sometimes, on Pentecost Sundays, preachers take to their pulpits to suggest that today's Christians need to reclaim that creativity, that people in the pews need to go out into the world with energy like that of wind and fire to share the love of Jesus. Sometimes, preachers do that in an effort to break up the ruts that we perceive the church might be falling into.

Last week, I attended the Festival of Homiletics as an on-line event. I usually attend in person every 3 or 4 years. It is a very high quality preaching festival which educates and inspires about 2000 preaching nerds like myself every year. One of my favorite things this year was the pastor

who said "All it took for us to find the creativity we so desperately needed was to get all the pastors out of their buildings." It was not an insult. It was offered as ironic humor at a time when the healing of laughter is sorely needed. It acknowledged how much creative energy pastors and church leaders have been exerting in response to the pandemic.

So, all those Pentecost preachers who exhorted their flocks to be creative with Spirit energy (and I might have been one of them) have seen that happen in a highly unexpected way. You have demonstrated your commitment to being a worshipping community by faithfully showing up for Zoom church every Sunday since March 22. Thank you

I trust that the Holy Spirit is active and moving among us still. And we need that creative, lifegiving energy, probably now more than ever. Friends, we are the church TOGETHER. It is our unity of spirit and love, not our presence in a building, that empowers our work on behalf of the gospel. We need each other. Life is going on in the midst of pandemic. We need our community for mutual support through all of our joys and concerns. We need our community to discern together how to be present for each other, how to keep growing in the way of Jesus when we can only gather in person in small, socially-distanced groups.

## Update from the Executive Team...

Your Executive Team is keeping tabs on the status of the Covid-19 pandemic and New York State policies. Churches will be among the last facilities to open. We anticipate that we will not be able to return to the sanctuary before Labor Day, at the earliest. If there is a resurgence of the virus in the late summer or fall, our return will be delayed indefinitely. In the meantime, Executive team is developing:

- a plan for a safe return to the sanctuary, when it is possible
- a plan for continuing on-line worship so that everyone may participate, no matter where they are or what their health status
- a plan for smaller gatherings of socially distanced people, wearing masks, throughout the summer

The FOCUS Board has named a search committee for the next permanent Executive Director, with the goal of finding a highly qualified person who will begin work by the end of August. The committee is made up of board members from each of the covenant congregations. Pastor Kathy is serving as Emmanuel's representative on the search committee.
