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I was on sabbatical at this

time last year. It seems longer ago than just one year, doesn't it? One of my as-yet-unfulfilled hopes for sabbatical had been to spend a week on the island of Iona, Scotland. You've undoubtedly heard me mention that before.

In the Middle Ages, Iona was the site of a monastery founded by Columba and his companions. They had been from Ireland in 563 CE. It became a very important spiritual center for Great Britain and Ireland over the next centuries. This was a time in church history when Celtic Christianity was distinctly different from the Roman church. In 1938, George MacLeod, a minister of the Church of Scotland, rebuilt the Abbey, which had become a ruin in the centuries since the monastery was abandoned in 849. He founded the Iona Community. The Iona Community is an ecumenical Christian community, committed to seeking new ways of living the gospel in today's world. It is also a leading force in the revival of Celtic spirituality. I still hope to go there one day, when that kind of travel is possible again.

The Celts were the fourth century inhabitants of what is now Scotland, Ireland, Wales, Cornwall and Brittany. Celtic Spirituality developed as Christianity reached those areas and became intertwined with pre-Christian agrarian rituals and understandings. It is a spirituality with an emphasis on the cycles of daily and seasonal life. We are living in a time that seems profoundly daily. Many of us have more time than ever before to notice the ordinary and celebrate the blessings inherent in each day. For this reason, I chose for August, a worship theme of "Bless to Me". I hope this emphasis will help to enhance our awareness and gratitude for daily occurrences of grace and blessing. I hope that we will gain an appreciation for Celtic spirituality with its recognition of the holy in the ordinary.

More people chose to be part of this worship design team than usual. I'm taking that as an indication of wider EBC interest in Celtic Spirituality. Keep reading for more details on our plans.

In coming weeks, the Emmanuel community will be investigating this approach to an authentic and grounded spirituality. Keep watch, dear Lord, with those who work, or watch, or weep this night, and give your angels charge over those who sleep. Tend the sick, Lord Christ; give rest to the weary, bless the dying, soothe the suffering, pity the afflicted, shield the joyous; and all for your love's sake. Amen.

Evening Prayer

The Celtic monks and others maintained a discipline known as praying the hours or the daily office. The work day was punctuated with prayers at set times.

These came to be known as

Prime (first hour, 6 a.m.),

Terce (third hour, 9 a.m.),

Sexth (sixth hour, 12 noon),

None (ninth hour, 3 p.m.)

Vespers (6 p.m.) and

Compline (7 p.m.) the last prayer of the day, from the Latin word for completion.

For the month of August, we will celebrate Evening Prayer (a loose combination of Vespers and Compline at 7 p.m. on Wednesday evenings. Pause with us to draw near to God at days' end. Expect these brief services (about 20 minutes) to include a reading from the Psalms or other scripture, silence and voiced prayers. Resources from the Northumbria Community and Iona and others will give this sacred time a Celtic flavor. Watch for a Zoom link coming to your e-mail.



Welcoming the stranger has been valued and practiced by people of faith from ancient times. Our latest growing edge involves extending hospitality in Zoom space. Beginning in August, our Sunday morning worship will begin with a more intentional welcoming and contemplative time.

At approximately 9:55 a.m., all microphones will be muted to allow for a quiet space and some words of welcome on the screen. We are positioning ourselves to better welcome newcomers. If walking into a church building where you don't know anyone is difficult, imagine showing up on a screen as a stranger. To make things easier, we will employ this quieter time before worship begins. You are invited to logon between 9:30 and 9:50 if you wish to greet people. You may also use the chat function to do so after microphones are muted.

The next step will be to share our worship on another platform which doesn't present the obstacle of requiring a password, probably Facebook Live or YouTube.

Congregational Meeting to be Held August 9th

Emmanuel is a complex church. We are a lifeline to our neighbors, we individually reveal God's presence today, we act together with other churches to influence a Christian approach to problems within our society. We also have stewardship responsibilities for our historic building, specifically with the technical preservation of our amazing, Victorian Gothic revival building in downtown Albany.

Humor from our Property & Financial Management commission (formerly Corporate Management) often describes the responsibilities of supporting the building as another episode in the continuing saga of "This Old Church." Hopefully you know that Emmanuel has been awarded accolades by the Historic Albany Foundation for our preservation of our 148-year-old historic building.

Water has not only rotted the wood members supporting the roof, but resulted in a partial collapse of two platforms.


Specially Spaced Picnics in August

From the Current Expense Treasurer...

As of June 30, 2020 income had totaled \$114,776, of which \$71,253 was pledge income. We also received \$18,200 from a PPP loan, of which all was spent to comply with the loan forgiveness requirements.

Total operating expenses were \$149,900, leaving a deficit of expenses compared to income of -\$35,124. No withdrawals from the Schwab investment account were taken during these first six months. If the usual withdrawal of \$10,500 had been taken, the deficit for Current Expense would have been -\$24,624.

Pledge income is about the same to this point as it was last year. As a reminder, you can support the church by giving online through the church's website, as many people have done, or send checks to the church. The finance team at Emmanuel is very grateful for your ongoing generous support. (KM)
