Pastoral Ponderings



I often hear the word *legacy* associated with the end of a person's life. It isn't used to refer to their estate or any tangible goods bequeathed to descendants, but rather to the impact of their life, the effect of their decisions and actions on those around them. At my mother's memorial service, I heard a story from her life that was brand new to me. Dave is one of my brother's friends and high school classmates. He drove several

miles to attend my Mom's service and to tell this story. Dave did well in school. He was an academic high achiever. His younger brother was not. He arrived at high school with serious deficits in his reading ability. He was reading so far below grade level that he was not going to graduate. Dave said that what he learned from Mrs. Donley brought his reading level up and enabled him to graduate on time with his peers. That accomplishment gave him an entirely new outlook on life and boosted his confidence in a way that Dave says he think would never have happened otherwise. Not long ago, he completed a college degree. A big part of my Mom's legacy may be found in the lives of her students.

My Mom always taught at the elementary level, until her elementary school closed. Then she was hired at the high school as a reading specialist. It was there that she met Dave's brother and many others like him. I was away at college by the time she started teaching high school. Having recently been a high school student myself, I could not imagine my mother teaching teenagers. First and second grade were always her favorites, but at her memorial service I came to realize that she must have found some satisfaction and success with those high schoolers too.

The death of loved ones always leads me to reflect on their life. At the passing of my mother, I am reflecting about her life and also my own. I am thinking about how faithful she was to her vocation as a teacher and the many different contexts in which that was expressed across her life. She taught in the USA, Ghana, Saudi Arabia, Uganda and Kenya. Each context required its own adaptations, but I think the biggest change was moving from elementary to high school, a change I wasn't sure she could successfully navigate.

I think about the changes that have been required of us as individuals and as members of a global community during the last year. I think about the ways that Emmanuel has adapted our ministries to meet emerging needs in times past and about how we are adapting even now. I suspect that when the pandemic is over we will find ourselves once again in a new

context requiring creativity and boldness and strong love. The example of those saints who have gone ahead of us helps me to trust that we will faithfully carry Emmanuel's legacy forward – a legacy of lives grounded in the gospel, infused with love, and sustained with hope. Thanks be to God.

A Guided Planning Retreat for Becoming the Congregation of Tomorrow February 26-27, 2021 Registration Deadline: February 14

For at least two years, Emmanuel's leadership has been discerning the next thing into which God is calling us. At the annual meeting, we received the recommendation of the Vision Committee which is to explore the model offered by *Fresh Expressions*. Fresh Expressions is an international movement of missionary disciples which cultivates new kinds of church alongside existing congregations to more effectively engage our growing post-Christian culture. We believe God is calling us to join this movement at this time.

Fresh Expressions is offering a retreat for congregations just like ours, congregations who need to know more. It is a Friday/Saturday retreat, taking place on-line from 7:00-9:00 pm on Friday, February 26 and from 9:00 a.m.-3:30 p.m. on Saturday, February 27. There will be informational sessions with recognized missional leaders and break-out times for conversation with other EBC folks.

Who should attend? YOU SHOULD, if

- You want to be directly involved in a new form of church created expressly for the benefit of those who are not yet part of any church,
- You want to support Emmanuel's corporate participation in this exciting, Spirit-led movement, even if you don't think you will have hands-on engagement,
- You want to understand the changes happening in Christianity in our time, especially as those changes have been accelerated by the crises of 2020.
