Pastoral Ponderings



This week, Edith Leet and I attended a presentation by the sociologists involved with the Churches that Thrive for Racial Justice project. They offered some preliminary findings from a survey and interviews conducted with members of Alliance of Baptists churches last fall. The survey engaged 1157 respondents, which is about 25% of the Alliance database, a strong sample size. The interviews were, on average, 1-hour conversations conducted over Zoom with 4-5 members of each church engaged in the project.

One of the most discouraging things I heard from the interviews was a sense that systemic racism will <u>never</u> be dismantled. This was expressed by people of color, many of whom have been active members of their churches for decades. On the other hand, one of the sociologists said that he was pleased to hear about how much was happening in the churches – book studies, seminars, movies, conversation groups – and he was surprised about the growth that people were reporting. He said that he doesn't usually hear mature adults talk about how much they learned that they didn't already know or about points of turning and transformation.

The pandemic started 2 years ago this month. Two years is nothing compared to the hundreds of years that white supremacy has ruled our country and most of our world, but two years of concentrated life experience have power. Through that experience, some of us have come to a better understanding of what it is like to have no control over some aspects of our daily life. We now recognize the presence of an invisible force that weighs on everything from how and when we interact with friends to our behavior at work and school to celebrations of milestones and holidays and how we mourn departed loved ones. We have felt just a smidge of the frustration and anger and possibly even despair that those oppressed by systemic racism have known since birth.

My heart aches for those who believe that white supremacy is intractable. My heart aches for those who are languishing in so many ways because of the pandemic. I realize, again, that it is good that we don't know the future. If anyone had said that we would have to cope with this prolonged disruption of life for two years, some of us would not have believed it and some of us would have despaired. Life comes to us one day at a time and that is enough.

These days I'm singing a song from South Africa (a country that has known incomparable suffering from both disease and white supremacy). The lyrics simply repeat *Come with me for the journey is long*, *come with me for the journey is long*. Additional verses include *sing with me*, *pray with me*, etc. The journey is long, beloved ones, but take heart, because change is happening all around us and we are sharing the journey together.

Lent 2022 March 2- April 16

The scriptures for this Lenten season are filled with parables and promises of God's abundant and expansive grace. Jesus as a mother hen, a prodigal son welcomed home, a fig tree nurtured with care and hope, precious oil poured out lovingly and freely, stones shouting out with praise — these sacred texts are brimming with a gospel of grace. 


Lenten Wednesdays 1:00-2:00 p.m. March 2, 9, 16, 23, 30, April 6, 13




