This season, we seek a clear, chronological storyline of the events leading up to and following Jesus's birth (or as clear a timeline as the Scriptures provide). We hone in on the human characters involved in the story. We

will read from the gospels of Matthew, Luke and John to tell the full scope of the Christmas story. Most weeks, there will also be a reading from the prophet Isaiah from Year A in the lectionary.

From Generation to Generation... reminds us of the ways our lives, histories, actions, and stories are interconnected and woven together. In the midst of narratives, policies, and rhetoric designed to divide us, what does it look like to practice belonging to one another? The work of God is always unfolding— in and through us. This Advent season, how will we carry it forth?




Pastoral Ponderings

We appreciate the work of Karen Green and Marilyn Malone in stitching the season's logo into this banner currently hanging in the sanctuary. You may see this graphic several times this season.

To some people, it looks like a rose. Others immediately see the people in a circle. The artist, Lauren Wright Pittman says "I knew I wanted to emphasize the particularity of each person while imaging how their story fits into a larger narrative—one in line with the generative work of God. I drew simplified silhouettes of people in a radial fashion, positioned around a center point. At once this imagery took on a depth of meaning: the lineage of Christ centered around his light, the nativity scene centered around the manger, and the larger

movement of God through each and every created being—radiating and growing like a flower. Ultimately, the image represents how we are all connected, our stories are woven together, and each of us has a purpose in the beauty of God's continued unfolding creation."

Can You Pass "The Christmas Quiz"?

We all know "the Christmas Story," right? Well, the scriptures tell a story we may not be as familiar with as we think. Only the Gospels of Matthew and Luke mention details about the birth of Jesus. And the two versions are VERY different.

Much of what we think of when we say "the Christmas story" isn't in the Bible at all. What are we missing? If the scripture stories aren't historically true, can they still contain Truth? Are the stories of the birth of Jesus still relevant?



- Q: How many sheep were in the stable with baby Jesus?
 - A: How many preschoolers are in a children's Christmas pageant?
- Q: How many kings brought gifts to the baby Jesus?
 - A: None. The Bible doesn't call them kings, and it never says how many there were.
- Q: Who got there first the night Jesus was born, the shepherds or the wise men (magi)?
 - A: Only Matthew mentions wise men (magi). Only Luke mentions shepherds. They were never depicted as together at the manger in scripture. Extra credit if you re-read Matthew 2 and identify the location where the wise men brought their gifts.

On Sunday mornings, Nov. 27 and Dec. 4 and 11, at 11:30 a.m. in the parlor, Rev. Jim Ketcham will help us learn the Biblical answers to "The Christmas Quiz." (But we can still put the wise men in our nativity scenes if we want to.)







THRIVE Program to Promote Work of Antiracism

The Alliance of Baptists, which created the THRIVE project that Emmanuel is part of, will present a webcast on December 6 from 7-8:30 p.m. called "Knowing Your Church's Past—Bringing Justice: What are the next steps for your church?" It is designed to help churches make the work of antiracism a fundamental part of their identity and outreach.

A presentation by Dr. Andrew Gardner will be followed by small-group discussions.

Dr. Gardner is a Postdoctoral Research Associate at Baylor University and is on the board of the Alliance of Baptists. He is the author of *Reimagining Zion: A History of the Alliance of Baptists* and *Binkley: A Congregational History* (2022).

Civil Rights Pilgrimage Postponed

The Civil Rights Pilgrimage planned for February has been postponed. We are disappointed in the delay, but still very enthusiastic about taking the trip. The projected itinerary includes a week of travel with visits to significant sites in Atlanta, Birmingham, Montgomery, Selma and Tuskegee. We want to go in-person because books and movies are not the same as being there. We want to go together because this trip has the potential to make transformative impressions of our racial history and the potential to bond the participants in lasting ways.

One of the reasons for the postponement is to make sure the opportunity is offered to as many participants as possible. The trip will happen either in
